A 10% increase in HOA Fees will be applied in 2018, making the annual HOA dues \$484.00. The 2018 annual assessment will be due January 1, 2018, and considered late if not paid by March 31. As of July 1, 2017, 97% of the homeowners have paid their 2017 assessment. Thank you!
